



The need for change



97% of students believe their opinion (public opinion) is worthy to be listened to and taken into consideration



60% would like improve their participation and be more actively engaged



86% think that some of the problems of their communities could be (partially) solved with a higher level of public



74% think that they would like to have a more active part in the resolution of problems and decision making in university life
